

Modern Slavery Statement - 2022

This statement has been published in accordance with Section 54 of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and the Modern Slavery Act 2015 (Transparency in Supply Chains) Regulation 2015 (the "Act").

It sets out the steps taken by IKO PLC during the year ending 31st December 2021 to prevent modern slavery and human trafficking in its business and supply chain.

Introduction

Slavery and trafficking are more than a just a crime. They are crimes against people and responsible for untold misery and suffering.

Our understanding of slavery and human trafficking is based on the definitions set out in the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and is guided by the UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the conventions of the International Labour Organisation, particularly relating to forced or compulsory labour.

We recognise that Modern Slavery is a complex issue affecting all sectors, regions and economies and understand that the term is used to denote human trafficking, forced labour and slavery-like practices such as debt bondage, and the sale or exploitation of children.

- Human Trafficking is the act of recruiting, transporting, transferring, harbouring or receiving a person, through any coercive means for the purpose of exploitation.
- Forced Labour is work or service that is taken from a person under the menace of a penalty and for which the person has not offered themselves voluntarily.
- Debt Bondage is a worker pledging their labour or the labour of others under their control as security for a debt, when either the real value of the work undertaken is never applied to repayment of the debt, or the length or nature of the work that has to be undertaken is never fully defined or limited.
- Sale and Exploitation of children involves situations where children are transferred by one person to another for remuneration or other consideration.

IKO PLC remains committed to combating the real and growing problem of modern slavery and trafficking. We recognise it can affect any industry and we take seriously our responsibility to be alert to the risks in our business and in our wider supply chain.

We expect our people, partners and suppliers to share our commitment to ensuring modern slavery does not exist in these areas.

IKO PLC has published six previous modern slavery statements (2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021). This statement provides an update on steps taken in 2021 to combat the risks of modern slavery and trafficking in our organisation and supply chains and outlines further developments to be undertaken in 2022.

This statement has been approved by the Board of Directors and by IKO PLC Group Managing Director.

Supply Chain

IKO PLC's Supply Chain consists of Products and Materials supplied from EU and North American IKO Companies, Raw Material suppliers, third party bought in finished goods for resale and 'non-stock' items and services.

Our 1st Tier Supply Chain suppliers for all products, 'raw materials', 'bought in goods' and 'services' are predominantly UK or EU based. The breakdown for 2021 suppliers contributing higher than 0.05% of total annual spend in terms of supplier location was;

As our customer base ranges across Specifiers and Installers, Merchants, Distribution and Retail we enjoy a relatively stable demand with limited seasonality and as such our labour force at each of our manufacturing sites are full time employed. This stability also extends to the demands made on our supply chain partners, which when combined with strategic forecasting as appropriate plus prompt payment for goods and services, means we can endeavour to assist our suppliers in effectively managing their operations.

Our supply chain is accredited to BES 6001 for responsible sourcing of raw materials and finished products, including being able to demonstrate responsible environmental and social practice and procedure, principally related to the manufacture and sale of Roofing and Waterproofing products.

Our approach to tackling the risk of modern slavery and human trafficking

Combating modern slavery and human trafficking is a reality all organisations face. Ultimate oversight and responsibility for the steps IKO PLC is taking and its approach to tackling Modern Slavery, as well as the publishing of this statement sits with the IKO Board.

In 2015 IKO PLC's Supply Chain Director and Purchasing Department were tasked with assessing the risk of modern slavery within its operations and its supply chain, undergo external training and instigate internal training programmes via IKO's Learning and Development team.

Our risk assessment process is continually under review so that IKO PLC and its supply chain partners can best assess the degree of risk and ascertain what areas require additional focus.

IKO PLC Policies – Related to Modern Slavery Ethics;

As part of our core organisational design IKO PLC promotes a culture of openness and accountability and aims to ensure all employees are clear about their roles and responsibilities in relation to risk management activities, reducing potential areas of conflict and promoting efficient and effective ways of working.

As reported in our previous statements IKO PLC has a number of policies and codes that are relevant to tackling modern slavery and trafficking with respect to its business and suppliers:

Slavery and human trafficking are abuses of a person's freedoms and rights. We are totally opposed to such abuse in our direct operations, indirect operations and supply chain and can confirm no labour is provided to the Organisation in the pursuance of the provision of its own services by means of slavery or human trafficking.

Employees within IKO PLC are free and entitled to be a member of and be represented by a Trade Union, currently there are two represented, Unite and GMB.

Risk Assessment and Due Diligence

As part of our initiative to identify and mitigate risk the following process is performed on an annual basis;

- New Suppliers and Service Providers are assessed based on annual spend.
- New Suppliers and Service Providers whose annual spend exceed 0.05% of total annual spend are then subjected to formal risk analysis.
- Mapping and Risk Analysis is conducted based on the following:
- Determine Supplier Category and identify as Product or Service.
- Determine Tier 1 Supplier Location.
- Determine Industry Sector.
- Assess likely Tier 2 Supply Chain Risk.
- Each element of mapping is risk assessed based on advice and findings of internationally recognised organisations such as publications and guides from the 'Walk Free Foundation'. Each Supplier and Service Provider is profiled by highlighting risks from their location, industry sector and potential labour cycles.
- Suppliers either Tier 1 or that we believe may have Tier 2 Med/High risk elements
 within their supply chain will be asked to provide documented evidence of their
 Supplier Audits that demonstrate that their Supply Chain meets our criteria as being
 fully conversant with and able to comply with the requirements of the Modern
 Slavery Act 2015.
- Risk assessed suppliers are required to complete a Supplier Self- Assessment
 Questionnaire detailing their policies and business practices in relation to adherence

with the Modern Slavery Act 2015. They are required to confirm that they fully understand and comply with the requirements of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 within their own operations and that they have taken steps to ensure their own supply chains are free of risk and can supply evidence to support their statement. This was updated for 2019 to make this process specific to Modern Slavery and still includes notification that failure to supply the required data or confirm their adherence to the requirements of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 will prompt their removal from active supplier status.

- Upon receipt of the completed Self-Assessment Questionnaire, IKO Purchasing
 Teams and Supply Chain Director review the supplied data against initial risk analysis
 and the severity of risk is either substantiated or updated. From this review a full
 Supplier Audit may be instigated to determine if there is a breach in adherence to
 the Modern Slavery Act 2015 which would prompt their removal from active supplier
 status.
- Existing Suppliers previously assessed must complete an annual declaration form to declare that they meet IKO's Modern Slavery requirements and advise IKO of any issues relating to Modern Slavery that they have identified.
- We have in place systems to encourage the reporting of concerns and the protection of whistle blowers.
- The company will not support or deal with any business knowingly involved in slavery or human trafficking.

Assessing our effectiveness in preventing Modern Slavery

To date no evidence has been found that would substantiate the presence of Modern Slavery within IKO Supply Chains. Four instances of Tier 1&2 medium/high risks have been identified, two of the Suppliers have undergone previous successful risk assessments and two has been suspended till further notice/risk assessment in 2022.

IKO are fully committed to supporting and implementing policies and procedures to eradicate this issue and are dedicated to performing ongoing supply chain assessments and the development of new measures to better assess, control and manage supply chain relationships.

Target 2022

In 2021 we committed to review our enhanced data collection and analysis process to ensure it is meeting our requirements in analysing our supply chain adherence to the Modern Slavery Act 2015. This was completed and it highlighted a number of areas that IKO PLC intends to further develop in 2022.

Priorities and KPI's for 2022

- Continue to develop processes for the selection of new suppliers that incorporates an initial modern slavery risk analysis.
- Continue with a formal supplier 'on-boarding' pack that will incorporate IKO's Purchasing Policy, Supplier Audit Questionnaire and Modern Slavery Questionnaire,

- including requests for copies of all relevant Quality, Environmental and Modern Slavery related policies and accreditations.
- Further develop supply chain mapping beyond Tier 1 to formally document Tier 2 by working with Suppliers to enhance their own Supply Chain Mapping.
- Develop the use of the 'Responsible Sourcing Tool' in conjunction with advice and reports from the 'Walk Free Foundation' to enhance our risk analysis process.
- Offer training sessions and work with suppliers that need to increase their knowledge and understanding of modern slavery and the steps they can use to assess their own supply chains.

Training

To ensure a high level of understanding of the risks of modern slavery and human trafficking in our supply chains and our business we provide training to relevant members of staff and Directors. This training is documented and refreshed on a biennial basis.

Summary

The Company Directors approve along with Senior Management to take responsibility for implementing this policy statement and its objectives and shall provide adequate resources and investment to ensure that slavery and human trafficking is not taking place within the organisation and its supply chain.

This statement is made pursuant to section 54(1) of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and constitutes our Companies human trafficking statement for the current financial year.
